The Alfred Allergy Symposium

It's not too late to register to attend **The Alfred Allergy Symposium**, to be held on Saturday 18th March 2017, 8:30am – 4:00pm in the AMREP Seminar Room, Alfred Hospital.

The day will take the form of a workshop with a major focus on interactive case discussions of important allergic presentations, developed with GP input.

Topics will include: Aero-allergy, thunderstorm asthma, drug allergy, food allergy, paediatric allergy, anaphylaxis & venom allergy, allergic skin conditions, occupational & environmental allergy.

The cost is \$180, and includes lunch and a course booklet. The symposium has received approval for 40 category one points with the RACGP QI&CPD program.

The Alfred GP Hotline

If you are concerned about the delay in an outpatient appointment, or if the patient's condition deteriorates, please contact the Unit Registrar to discuss and expedite the patient's care.

Health warning on mosquitoes and Ross River virus

Residents and visitors to Victoria are being warned to protect themselves against mosquito-borne diseases such as Ross River virus, Barmah Forest virus and Murray Valley encephalitis.

Ross River virus has been detected in mosquitoes in southern metropolitan Melbourne, in addition to regional Victoria, indicating that there is a risk of mosquito-borne infection across Victoria. West Nile / Kunjin virus has been detected in a sentinel chicken in Shepparton.

Please advise patients that the best protection from mosquito-borne diseases is to avoid mosquito bites – use mosquito repellent containing picaridin or DEET, wear long and loose fitting clothing when outside, and ensure accommodation is mosquito proof.

Please consider the possibility of mosquito-borne disease in patients presenting with a compatible illness, especially after travel to regional Victoria. Notify Murray Valley encephalitis immediately on suspicion and Ross River and Barmah Forest virus after laboratory confirmation.

Zoster Vaccine contraindicated in immune-compromised patients.

Zoster vaccine is now available for 70-79 year olds under the National Immunisation Program.

Zoster vaccine is safe and effective for immune-competent patients, but it is a live vaccine and is contraindicated in patients who are immune-compromised.

In addition to being contraindicated for those with previous anaphylaxis to the vaccine or its components, it is vital all GPs are aware of the following contraindications, which include, but is not limited to:

- Haematological or generalised malignancies (including those not on treatment): e.g. lymphoma, acute or chronic leukaemia, Hodgkin's disease;
- Solid organ or bone marrow transplant recipients (with exceptions as advised by specialists);
- HIV/AIDS (with exceptions as advised by specialist) or other congenital/acquired immunodeficiencies;
- Current or recent high-dose systemic immunosuppressive therapy: e.g. chemotherapy, radiation therapy, oral corticosteroids, disease modifying anti-rheumatic drugs.

The assessment of immune status can be complicated in some patients. If in doubt, defer vaccination and seek advice.
